St. Petersburg College

Access and excellence are the hallmarks of St. Petersburg College, founded in 1927 as St. Petersburg Junior College, Florida's first two-year institution of higher education.

Today the college stands as a multi-campus, two-year and four-year public institution with learning sites countywide in St. Petersburg, Clearwater, Tarpon Springs, Pinellas Park, Largo and Seminole. More than 63,000 students a year are served by SPC, including students in residence from many countries.

The Seminole Campus, which opened in August 1998, includes the C.W. Bill Young University Partnership Center (UPC) and the Dennis L. Jones Seminole Community Library. Since 1999, the UPC has enabled students to earn baccalaureate and graduate degrees from partner institutions without leaving Pinellas County. There are now 17 partners offering about 90 degrees.

Since early 2001, the college has offered more online programs than any other community college in the state and more than most of Florida's universities.

In June 2001, legislation was signed by Gov. Jeb Bush enabling SPJC to become the first among Florida's 28 public community colleges to transition to a four-year institution. The college dropped the "Junior" from its name, but not its commitment to its two-year mission, which remains as strong as ever.

St. Petersburg College seeks to be a creative leader and partner with students, communities, service agencies, businesses and other educational institutions to deliver enriched learning experiences and to promote economic and workforce development.

The work of its outstanding, diverse faculty and staff is enhanced by advanced technologies, online learning, international education opportunities, innovative teaching techniques, comprehensive library and other information resources, continuous institutional self-evaluation, a climate for student success and an enduring commitment to excellence.

St. Petersburg College is dedicated to the concept of equal opportunity. The college will not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin or marital status, or against any qualified individual with disabilities, in its employment practices or in the admission and treatment of students. Degrees offered

<u>Bachelor of Applied Science (B.A.S.) degrees</u> — St. Petersburg College offers B.A.S. degrees in Banking, Dental Hygiene, Health Services Administration, International Business, Management and Organizational Leadership, Orthotics and Prosthetics, Paralegal Studies, Public Safety Administration, Technology Management and Veterinary Technology.

<u>Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degrees</u> — St. Petersburg College offers a B.S. in Education with nine different areas of concentration and a B.S. in Nursing.

<u>Associate in Arts (A.A.) degrees</u> — Students can choose from more than 200 majors that transfer to virtually any accredited university worldwide. An A.A. degree from SPC, by law, grants admission as a junior to one of the state's 10 public universities.

<u>Associate in Science (A.S.) degrees</u> — Students gain skills for careers in as little as two years. A.S. degrees enable students to enter the workforce immediately after graduation and allow those already in fields to upgrade their job skills. A.S. degrees in some fields grant students admission to other private and public universities.

<u>Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.) degrees</u> — Students gain skills for careers in as little as two years. A.A.S. degrees enable students to enter the workforce immediately after graduation and allow those already in fields to upgrade their job skills.

<u>Technical Certificates (C.T.)</u> - Students can prepare for new professions or enhance existing job skills, in less time than an Associate in Science degree. In some cases, students can complete a C.T. within a year.

<u>Advanced Technical Certificates (A.T.C.)</u> —Advanced Technical Certificates are currently offered in different areas of Health Science, and can be awarded to students who already have an associate degree and are seeking advanced training.

<u>Applied Technology Diploma (A.T.D.)</u> — An Applied Technology Diploma is part of an Associate in Science degree (A.S.) or an Associate in Applied Science degree (A.A.S.), but is less than 60 credit hours. An Applied Technology Diploma program may consist of either vocational or college credit and can lead to employment in specific occupations.

Some of the college's honors in 2007-08:

- Ranked No. 3 in the nation's "Top 10 Tech-Savvy Community Colleges"
- Ranked No. 4 in the U.S. for the number of associate degrees awarded annually in nursing
- Ranked No. 7 in the U.S. for the number of associate degrees awarded annually in health professions
- Ranked No. 11 in the U.S. in associate degrees awarded

Highlights of 2007-08

- SPC's Early College Program opened on the Clearwater Campus in fall 2007 and was so successful that it expanded to the Seminole and Tarpon Springs campuses in fall 2008. The program, which served 94 students at the Clearwater Campus, will admit 125 students at each location. The Early College Program is a partnership between SPC and Pinellas County Schools. It offers academically talented 11th and 12th graders the opportunity to earn high school and college credits at the same time.
- Student Pamela Himmel was recognized as the Outstanding eLearning Student in the nation at the Instructional Technology Council's eLearning 2008 Conference in February, 2008. She returned to school at the urging of her two teenaged daughters, Tricia and Shara. Tricia was a student at the University of Central Florida, and Shara was finishing the International Baccalaureate Program at St. Petersburg High School. Shara, who had undergone a heart transplant at 4, started having cardiac problems again. Doctors said another transplant would be necessary. At 19, Shara was admitted to Shands Hospital in Gainesville to await a new heart. Pamela went along, and the two studied together. By this time, Shara was enrolled at the University of Florida and mom through SPC's eCampus. Shara received her new heart and, initially, did well. Then she experienced complications and died. In spite of her grief, Pamela successfully completed her term's studies, earning top grades in the process. She graduated in May.
- Nathan Crock, a student at the St. Petersburg/Gibbs Campus, was named one of just 20 students on the All-USA Today Community College Academic First Team. Crock, who maintained a 3.89 grade point average, earned \$2,500 for his accomplishment. Crock, 20, was president of the Honors College, vice president of Phi Theta Kappa, and president of the Engineering Club.
- In SPC's most recent Graduating Student Survey, ninety-eight percent of the graduates said they would recommend the college to their friends and family.
- The St. Petersburg College baseball team qualified for the state tournament for the 11th year in a row after winning the Suncoast Conference title.
- The college added another partner institution to the 16 colleges and universities from around the country that offer degrees in Pinellas County through SPC's University Partnership Center (UPC). National University of Health Sciences in Lombard, Ill., hopes to begin offering classes in Pinellas by fall 2009. Like other institutions affiliated with the UPC, National will partner with the college for classroom space and support services so that students can study at National without leaving Pinellas County.

- The landmark Palladium Theater, which was taken over by SPC in December 2006, underwent a series of upgrades and renovations before launching its 10th anniversary season.
- The Florida Orchestra moved its administrative offices into the college's Downtown Center.
- Construction began on an addition to the Downtown Center that will include a new home for American Stage Theater Company.
- The Florida International Museum, now part of the college, hosted the successful *Splendors of the Vatican* exhibit, which drew more than 100,000 visitors in three months.
- A \$36-million renovation project began on the Clearwater Campus. The three-year
 project includes two new buildings and the destruction of the Fine Arts Building. A
 portion of the science building also will be torn down, and the remainder of the building
 will be upgraded and modernized.
- The new \$11-million Orthotics and Prosthetics building at the Caruth Health Education Center opened for classes in May. SPC's Orthotics and Prosthetics program is the largest of just four such four-year programs in the U.S.
- Fall enrollment in the college's R.N. to B.S.N. program was up more than 50 percent over the same period in 2006. The program began in 2002 with 65 students. More than 400 are now enrolled.
- Nearly 600 volunteers ranging in age from 16 to 90 last year donated more than 15,000 hours.
- The college established the Male Outreach Initiative, a program designed to boost male enrollments. It is based on Women on the Way, a program the college established a number of years ago in response to chronically low enrollments among women. In recent years, the enrollment of females has been steadily climbing, while enrollment numbers for men have been in steady decline.

APPENDIX D

Services for Students with Disabilities

St. Petersburg College provides comprehensive academic support for any student who presents qualifying documentation of disability. Beginning with the formation of the Program for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing in 1966 and the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities in 1991, SPC has been a leader in serving students with special needs. A faculty-level Learning Specialist is available at each campus to supply information, approve documentation, arrange accommodations, and provide student and faculty support, with the assistance of a staff of over 20 professionals and 100 student volunteers collegewide.

The type of qualifying documentation needed varies with the diagnosis. A description of the correct paperwork to submit for consideration is available on the SPC website at www.spcollege.edu, or from any Learning Specialist. Services are assigned on an individualized basis, and may include testing accommodations, priority registration, interpreters, audio amplification equipment, C-Print captioning, notetakers, brailling, electronic textbooks and handouts, captioned and screen-reader usable electronic presentations, scribes, readers or taped testing, low-vision enhancement equipment, adaptive computers, permission to use spellcheckers or tape recorders, adaptive desks or chairs, limited professional tutoring, or other services as approved. All services are provided without cost to the student.
