ST. PETERSBURG COLLEGE

Overview

Access and excellence are the hallmarks of St. Petersburg College, founded in 1927 as St. Petersburg Junior College, Florida's first two-year institution of higher education.

Today the college stands as a multi-campus, two-year and four-year public institution with learning sites countywide in St. Petersburg, Clearwater, Tarpon Springs, Pinellas Park, Largo and Seminole. More than 63,000 students a year are served by SPC, including students in residence from many countries.

Dr. Bill Law became St. Petersburg College's sixth president on June 7, 2010, following the retirement of Carl M. Kuttler Jr. who served as president for 31 years.

The college added baccalaureate degrees to its educational offerings in 2002, becoming the first among Florida's 28 public community colleges to transition to a four-year institution. SPC now offers 23 bachelor's degrees, most in areas that have traditionally been underserved by the State University System.

The Seminole Campus, which opened in August 1998, includes the C.W. Bill Young University Partnership Center (UPC) and the Dennis L. Jones Seminole Community Library. Since 1999, the UPC has enabled students to earn baccalaureate and graduate degrees from partner institutions without leaving Pinellas County. There are now 17 partners offering more than 100 degrees.

Following the June 2001 legislation signed by Gov. Jeb Bush that enabled SPJC to offer bachelor's degrees, the college dropped the "Junior" from its name, but not its commitment to its two-year mission, which remains as strong as ever.

In May, 2009, The American Stage Theatre joined The Florida International Museum, The Florida Orchestra, and the box office for The Palladium Theater at the college's Downtown Center, solidifying the location as SPC's Downtown Arts Cultural Center. The college also owns the Leepa-Rattner Museum on the Tarpon Springs Campus.

St. Petersburg College seeks to be a creative leader and partner with students, communities, service agencies, businesses and other educational institutions to deliver enriched learning experiences and to promote economic and workforce development.

The work of its outstanding, diverse faculty and staff is enhanced by advanced technologies, online learning, international education opportunities, innovative teaching techniques, comprehensive library and other information resources, continuous institutional self-evaluation, a climate for student success and an enduring commitment to excellence.

St. Petersburg College is dedicated to the concept of equal opportunity. The college will not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin or marital status, or against any qualified individual with disabilities, in its employment practices or in the admission and treatment of students. Recognizing that sexual harassment constitutes discrimination on the basis of sex and violates this rule, the college will not tolerate such conduct.

Degrees offered

Bachelor of Applied Science (B.A.S.) degrees — St. Petersburg College offers B.A.S. degrees in Banking, Dental Hygiene, Health Services Administration, International Business, Management and Organizational Leadership, Orthotics and Prosthetics, Paralegal Studies, Public Safety Administration, Sustainability Management, Technology Management, and Veterinary Technology.

Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degrees — St. Petersburg College offers a B.S. in Education with nine different areas of concentration and a B.S. in Nursing, Biology, Business Administration, and Public Policy and Administration.

Associate in Arts (A.A.) degrees — Students can choose from more than 200 majors that transfer to virtually any accredited university worldwide. An A.A. degree from SPC, by law, grants admission as a junior to one of the state's 10 public universities.

Associate in Science (A.S.) degrees — Students gain skills for careers in as little as two years. A.S. degrees enable students to enter the workforce immediately after graduation and allow those already in fields to upgrade their job skills. A.S. degrees in some fields grant students admission to other private and public universities.

Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.) degrees — Students gain skills for careers in as little as two years. A.A.S. degrees enable students to enter the workforce immediately after graduation and allow those already in fields to upgrade their job skills.

Technical Certificates (C.T.) - Students can prepare for new professions or enhance existing job skills, in less time than an Associate in Science degree. In some cases, students can complete a C.T. within a year.

Advanced Technical Certificates (A.T.C.) —Advanced Technical Certificates are currently offered in different areas of Health Science, and can be awarded to students who already have an associate degree and are seeking advanced training.

Applied Technology Diploma (A.T.D.) — An Applied Technology Diploma is a part of an Associate in Science degree (A.S.) or an Associate in Applied Science degree (A.A.S.), but is less than 60 credit hours. An Applied Technology Diploma program may consist of either vocational or college credit and can lead to employment in specific occupations.

Some of the college's honors in 2009-10:

- SPC led all Florida community colleges students enrolled in distance learning courses during the 2008-09 academic year.
- Ranked No. 57 nationwide in awarding associate degrees to African-American students by Issues in Higher Education magazine.
- Ranked No. 10 in the number of associate degrees awarded, All Disciplines category
- Ranked No. 8 in the U.S. for the number of associate degrees awarded annually in nursing
- Ranked No. 12 in the U.S. for the number of associate degrees awarded annually in Health Professions and Related Clinical Sciences

Highlights for 2009-10:

- SPC's president, Dr. Bill Law Jr., began his new job on June 7. He was president of Tallahassee Community College for the previous eight years; before that, he served as president of Montgomery College in Texas.
- Work began June 1 on the college's new Veterinary Technology Special Purpose Center on Ulmerton Road in Largo. The 32,768-square-foot building will include three classrooms and three labs as well as surgical suites and office space.
- NASA Astronaut and former St. Petersburg Junior College student Nicole Stott delivered the commencement address to graduates at ceremonies at Tropicana Field on May 8, 2010. She also was named Alumna of the Year.
- SPC was named Outstanding Business of the Year by the Gulf Coast Chapter of the U.S. Green Building Council. The award recognizes businesses that demonstrate a commitment to green building initiatives and a culture of sustainability.
- SPC opened a new mock courtroom at the Clearwater Campus for the benefit of Paralegal Studies students. The mock courtroom has a three-seat judiciary bench, a witness stand, a table for the clerk of the court, defense and plaintiff tables, a 12-seat jury section and a rail that separates the court from the 60-seat spectator area.
- Trustees approved a master plan for new construction and remodeling at the Clearwater Campus. The plan took 18 months to complete, and it describes how \$127 million in capital improvements will be accomplished. In all, eight buildings on the campus were identified for demolition.
- Spring enrollment increased 13.6 percent over the same period in the previous year. SPC's four-year programs experienced a 22 percent enrollment increase.
- SPC's student athletes maintained a high level of academic excellence during the year. Mark Strickland, director of Enrollment Management and Athletics, said 37 percent of the college's student athletes maintained a 3.0 or higher GPA during the fall term.
- Carl M. Kuttler Jr., president of St. Petersburg College for 31 years, announced his retirement. Thomas E. Furlong, retired Senior Vice President of Baccalaureate Programs and University Partnerships, was named to replace Kuttler on an interim basis as the Board of Trustees undertook a nationwide search for Kuttler's permanent successor.

- Thanks to a story in USA Today about the wide-open field of veterinary technology, SPC's Vet Tech program received several months of very favorable nationwide publicity. The highlight was a lengthy segment on the CBS Evening News, which led to stories in a number of nationally-recognized newspapers and magazines.
- The U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) awarded LEED Gold certifications for two SPC buildings. The Natural Science, Mathematics and College of Education building on the Clearwater campus and the Student Services Building on the St. Petersburg/Gibbs campus were named. Both conform to the LEED Green Building rating System.
- Jerry Woodson first enrolled at St. Petersburg Junior College in 1967. In 2009, 42 years after he started classes, he earned his degree.
- St. Petersburg Collegiate High School placed among Florida's best schools on the 2009 Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test. SPCHS student scored higher than students at any other high school in Pinellas County, and placed among the best statewide.
- Nicole Moore-Etheridge, who graduated in 2009 with a degree in public safety administration, became the first person in SPC history to earn a military commission through the Reserve Officer Training Corps.
- The new Music Industry Recording Arts (MIRA) program opened its new recording studio on the St. Petersburg/Gibbs Campus. The year-old program already had more than 120 students who hope to work in the music and entertainment industries.
- SPC prepares for an influx of veterans enrolling following their service in Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere. The college said in November that it already had 885 students who were veterans, and many more are expected to take advantage of new veteran's educational benefits.
- The University Partnership Center, a partnership among SPC and 17 other institutions of higher learning, celebrated its 10th anniversary. The UPC allows students in Pinellas County to earn degrees from the partner institutions without leaving home.
- St. Petersburg College's Fire Science Program grew to be the largest of its kind in the state of Florida, and one of the largest in the U.S. The program is offered 100 percent online. Between 500 and 600 students are served by the program each term.
